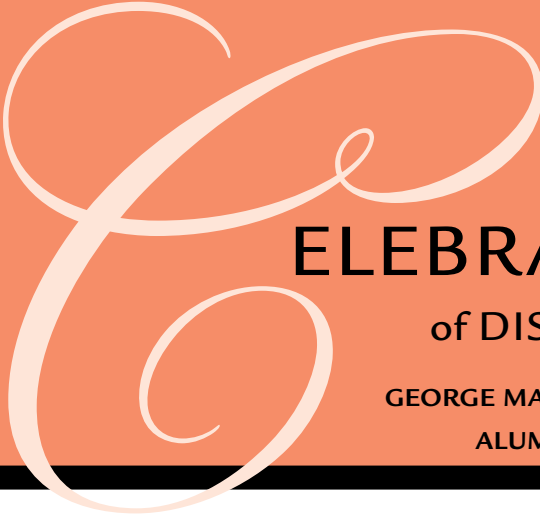

THE DISTINGUISHED BLACK ALUMNI AWARD

A native of Chesterfield, Virginia, **Reverend J. Lee Hill Jr.**, BA Integrative Studies '01, is a life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc. and has been involved in ministry and youth development for more than a decade. He is a licensed and ordained Baptist minister with dual standing in the United Church of Christ. Hill earned an MDiv (with graduation honors) from Wake Forest University, where he served as an adjunct instructor in urban ministry at its Divinity School. He also has served on the board of the Alliance of Baptists, a movement of progressive Christians, and the executive board of Rauschenbusch Metro Ministries at Metro Baptist Church in Hell's Kitchen, New York. A strong advocate for mission and social justice, Hill has led mission teams to Vietnam, New York City, and Washington, D.C.; throughout the South; and annually to New Orleans for the continued ministry of relief and recovery from Hurricane Katrina. He is studying toward a doctor of ministry degree in the area of transformational missions from the New York Theological Seminary. In winter 2010, *Ebony Magazine* named Hill among the Ebony Power 100 as an emerging leader in the field of religion for his work at Riverside Church in New York as minister with children, youth, and young adults.

THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION AND HUMAN DEVELOPMENT DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Dr. Dean M. Ravizza, BSEd Physical Education '91 and MS Physical Education '92, is an assistant professor in the Salisbury University Department of Health and Sport Sciences, Seidel School of Education and Professional Studies. Ravizza, who earned a PhD in curriculum and instruction from Virginia Tech, is considered a pioneer in the use of sports for development, peace, and social change. In addition to his university position, he has worked as a coordinator of physical education, sports, and activities in Venezuela, Hungary, and Tanzania. His most recent efforts have focused on rehabilitation and reintegration of former child soldiers and other victims of Ugandan conflict. In particular, Ravizza initiated a holistic sports program for boys and girls that incorporates peace education and conflict resolution, HIV and malaria awareness, social inclusion of females and people with disabilities, and the building of positive social networks. His goal is to enhance participant self-esteem and skills through sport, thereby helping children successfully transition back into their communities, as well as better informing governmental and nongovernmental agencies to promote peace and stability in postconflict settings. Ravizza is working on a joint project with the United Nations High Commission for Refugees called

He is a member of the International Sport for Development and Peace Association; the International Council for Sport Science and Physical Education; the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance; and Kappa Delta Pi International Honor Society in Education.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Reverend Brian T. Butch, BS Social Work '87, was active in the Student Government while at Mason. He interned at the Woodbine Nursing Home, the Boy's Probation House, and the Montgomery County Human Relations Commission. Butch went on to study at Mt. St. Mary's Seminary where he received a master of divinity degree and was ordained a Roman Catholic priest. He received his MSW from Fordham University and is a licensed clinical social worker in New Jersey. Butch has worked in numerous parishes, has served as director of Catholic Relief Services and the Catholic Campaign for Human Development, and was chair of the Priest's Counsel. He also served as a governor's appointee to the New Jersey Mental Health Citizen's Advisory Board. He is a trustee for Brookdale Community College and served on the Jersey Shore University Medical Center Community Advisory Board. He currently is a governor's appointee associate board member to the New Jersey State Parole Board. Butch is in the process of completing a master's degree in criminal justice at Monmouth University, where he serves as an adjunct faculty member in the School of Social Work.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Dr. David S. Robarge, BA History and Government and Politics '77 and MA History '82, earned a bachelor degree from Mason with high distinction; he later completed his PhD in American history from Columbia University. Today, Robarge is chief historian for the CIA. He has been with the CIA since 1996, during which time he worked with its Counterterrorism Center and the Directorate of Intelligence as an analyst on the Palestinian and Iraq accounts. He has published a classified biography of John McCone, director of Central Intelligence, and a biography of Chief Justice John Marshall. His articles and book reviews have appeared in the CIA's in-house journal. Robarge has taught intelligence history at Mason since 1998.

THE COLLEGE OF SCIENCE DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Mark D. Monson, BS Biology '74, is deputy director for administration of the Virginia Department of Health Professions. He has extensive experience in administration, finance, and information technology from past positions with the Department of Correctional Education, the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, the Department of Economic Development, the Department of Planning and Budget, and the State Water Control Board (now part of the Department of Environmental Quality). Before joining the state government, Monson worked for the Fairfax County government. Monson is involved in a number of community organizations, including the Louisa County Industrial Development Authority, and was cited in a recent textbook on ethics in government published by the American Society for Public Administration. He has an MS in administration from George Washington University and a certificate in information systems from Virginia Commonwealth University.

THE THOMAS W. ISZARD III DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Since September 2002, **Nancy A. Gross**, BFA Dance '97, has served as the director and sole instructor for the dance program housed under Woodbridge Senior High School's Center for the Fine and Performing Arts, as well as writing all curriculum and course work associated with each class. Gross strives to provide her students with a wide range of learning opportunities, often inviting faculty from Mason's School of Dance to lead master classes, accessing other guest teachers via Mason's community outreach program, and encouraging her students to attend events sponsored by Mason's dance program. She is a guest speaker for the Senior Synthesis class and Teaching Principles class taken by Mason dance majors. She also has played a leadership role within the Friends of Dance at Mason and has mentored many Mason dance students. Gross's students have gone on to attend major universities and dance schools across the United States. Most recently, one of her students was selected to join the Mark Morris Dance Group. Gross is pursuing a master's degree in education from Mason.

THE INSTITUTE FOR CONFLICT ANALYSIS AND RESOLUTION DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Mary L. Wade, PhD Conflict Analysis and Resolution '05, serves as associate minister at Wayland Temple Baptist Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and cofounded Building Respect in Community, a north Philadelphia-based community

organization that inspires hope, peace, and nonviolence. She is convener of the Thurman Group, ministers and lay leaders who educate the community on the life and activism of theologian, educator, and civil rights activist Howard Thurman, and founder of Light Messenger inspirational programs to motivate youth and adults. She also is a member of the Nobel Peace Prize Nominating Committee of the American Friends Service Committee and Heeding God's Call, an organization of religious leaders organized to stop the illegal sale of guns. Wade has served as Quaker Human Rights Representative to the United Nations and founded the African American Committee on the United Nations. Wade has lived in three countries and traveled in close to 50. She is a poet and writer.

THE LAMBDA DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Darren W. Marquardt, BFA Dance '96, owner, CEO, and realtor with the Marquardt Team Inc., is ranked the 10th highest producer for the Northern Virginia/West Virginia region and is in the top 5 percent of real estate professionals nationwide. The consummate business leader, Marquardt is a founding member of the Northern Virginia Business Alliance. Along with his professional obligations, he sits on the boards of several community foundations and committees, raises money for charities and civic groups, and provides four to six scholarships and community service awards each year to graduating high school students. Marquardt also is a world-class level professional ballroom and Latin dancer.

NEW CENTURY COLLEGE DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

The day after **Jamie L. Konstas**, BS Integrative Studies '00, graduated from New Century College (NCC) with concentrations in international management, politics, and Spanish, she accepted a position with the FBI, where she has been employed for more than 10 years. As an FBI intelligence analyst, she works to combat crimes against children and is a national expert for her work protecting prostituted children in the United States. Konstas develops solutions to some of the most challenging problems facing law enforcement, including an award-winning national database and national sting operations. Her efforts have led to the recovery of more than 1,200 children and the prosecution of more than 600 human traffickers. Konstas has been recognized for her achievements with awards from the U.S. attorney general, the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, and the Partnership for Public Service.

THE SCHOOL OF LAW DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Kathryn (Kelly) McNamara Corley, JD '89, attended Mason's School of Law's evening program while working full time at Dean Witter Financial Services Group, focusing on legislative issues facing Sears banking services. Morgan Stanley Discover Financial Services, the result of a series of mergers and spin offs, gave McNamara Corley ever-increasing duties and responsibilities with the company. She currently serves as executive vice president, general counsel, and secretary of Discover Financial Services where she manages legal advisory and compliance matters related to the company's credit, banking, and transaction services. Her dedication to her community is clear given her active membership on several nonprofit boards in the Chicago area. She is a member of the board of the History Makers, a national nonprofit group committed to preserving, developing, and providing access to an archival collection of thousands of African American video oral histories. In addition, she serves on the board of Haven Youth and Family Services.

THE SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Susan B. Gregg, BS Accounting '85, has more than 20 years of experience in public accounting, with a concentration in the area of taxation. Her expertise in the areas of personal, corporate, and partnership taxation has opened several opportunities for her to represent clients in the U.S. justice system and before the Internal Revenue Service. Recognized by *Virginia Business* magazine as a Super CPA, Gregg was previously named one of the Top 30 Accountants by *Washingtonian* magazine. Throughout her practice, she has dealt with complex issues, including tax planning, entity structuring, and succession planning. Gregg has substantial experience in gift and estate taxation.

THE SCHOOL OF PUBLIC POLICY DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Maen F. Al-Nsour, PhD Public Policy '98, is director-general of the Social Security Corporation (SSC) in Jordan. Prior to that, he was special advisor to the prime minister of Jordan. Nsour served as CEO of the Jordan Investment Board and served as an advisor at the Regional Bureau for Arab States, United Nations Development Programme in New York, and director of the Policy Planning Department at the Ministry of Planning in Amman, Jordan. Nsour sits on the boards of directors of the SSC, the Pension Board at SSC, the Investment Fund at SSC, the Economic and Social Council, the Insurance Regulation Commission, and the Amman Institute for Urban Development. He previously sat on the boards of directors of Jordan-Dubai Capital, Jordan Industrial Estates Corporation, the Greater Amman Municipality,

and Jordan Enterprise Development Corporation. Nsour teaches graduate courses at the University of Jordan. He also taught at Mason. Nsour was also a researcher at the U.S. Institute of Peace in Washington, D.C.

THE VOLGENAU SCHOOL OF ENGINEERING DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Steven M. Schorling, MS Information Systems '98 and PhD Information Technology '00, served in the U.S. Air Force from 1970 to 1992. During his air force career, he held flying and staff positions with the Strategic Air Command. In addition, he was a nuclear physicist working closely with the National Laboratories at Los Alamos and Lawrence Livermore. Prior to being assigned to the Pentagon, he was a federal executive fellow with the Center for Public Policy at the Brookings Institution in Washington, D.C., where he participated in the formulation of public policy. In 2004, Schorling returned to the Pentagon as a senior systems engineer with SRA International. He currently supports the director of defense research and engineering within the Office of the Secretary of Defense with a focus on new technologies for military capabilities.

THE SENIOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

Mariana X. Cruz will receive a BS in civil, environmental, and infrastructure engineering at the 2011 Commencement ceremony in May. She was recruited to the Civil, Environmental, and Infrastructure Engineering Program as the recipient of the William and Susan Eddy Soza Distinguished Scholarship in the fall 2007 semester. Cruz has excelled academically, consistently appearing on the Dean's List with a 3.50 or better GPA each semester she has been at Mason. She participates in the Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (LSAMP) Program, which works to increase the number of underrepresented minority students completing degrees in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) majors, as well as the number of these graduates who are well qualified to pursue advanced STEM degrees at top universities. A multitasking individual with broad interests, Cruz has undertaken a diverse set of initiatives, devising new programs and services whenever she discovers an unmet need. She became the founding president for a student organization associated with the LSAMP Program and was elected to serve as president of the Society of Hispanic Professional Engineers for the 2010–11 academic year. During her second year at Mason, Cruz was selected as a peer advisor for the Volgenau School of Engineering. She is frequently called on by the Dean's Office to assist with

new student recruitment and new student orientation activities. During fall semester of her junior year, Cruz participated in the Engineers without Borders program in Peru, evaluating irrigation and drinking water strategies for an Andean village. She also participated in Research Experiences for Undergraduates under the direction of a member of the civil engineering faculty. In addition, Cruz served as co-moderator for seminars sponsored by Volgenau's Academic Challenges and Enrichment Scholars Program.

THE FACULTY MEMBER OF THE YEAR

Dr. Don M. Boileau is a professor of communication at George Mason University. He joined the university full time in 1987. Boileau received a PhD, as well as a master's in rhetoric and public address, from the University of Oregon. He received a bachelor's degree in political science from Stanford University. Boileau was a Peace Corps volunteer in Korea from 1968 to 1969. His research focuses on instructional communication, and he has written more than 35 articles on teaching communication that vary from defining the field to how to teach public speaking. At Mason, Boileau helped develop the nation's first doctorate in community college teaching, and he was the first coordinator of the Linked Courses Program. Boileau was chair of Mason's Faculty Senate for three years. Boileau, who won three teaching awards from Lambda Pi Eta, the student honor society in communication, between 2001 and 2008, also taught at Central Michigan University, the University of Washington, the University of Oregon, Lane Community College, and Central Washington University. Boileau was president of the Eastern Communication Association and also worked for the National Communication Association as director of education for more than six years.

THE ALUMNI SERVICE AWARD

Kaylene H. Green, BS Accounting '87, has 35 years combined experience in the federal relations arena, having held leading positions in the private sector and staff positions on Capitol Hill and the Department of Defense. In 2009, she cofounded Flagship Government Relations, a business development and lobbying firm, and serves as its president and partner. Prior to that, Kaylene was at PMA Group, where she held several positions, including vice chair, chief operating officer, and Defense Group leader. Her areas of specialty include shipbuilding, electronics, and advanced technology, and her broad network of government relationships include key members of Congress, congressional staff, and executive branch officials. Prior

to PMA, Kaylene was vice president of Washington Operations for Bath Iron Works Corporation. Earlier in her career, she worked on the staffs of a senior U.S. senator, the Senate Committee on Armed Services, and the Department of the Navy's Office of Legislative Affairs. Kaylene is a member of the American Society of Naval Engineers, the Propeller Club, the National Defense Industrial Association, the Surface Navy Association, and the Navy League. She has been a frequent lecturer on the importance and effectiveness of lobbying in the political process and the federal government and defense budget process.

Born in Franklin, Virginia, **Robert E. Green III**, BS Elementary Education '76, the son of a career navy officer, lived in numerous locations throughout the United States. He graduated from Duke University with a BA in history in 1965. Upon graduation from Duke, he joined the Alexandria, Virginia, police department, gaining the rank of detective. He left in 1972 to open a private investigative business, which he operated for several years before beginning his career with the Department of the Navy. Robert worked for the U.S. Department of the Navy for more than 25 years; most of that time was spent in the Office of the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Financial Management and Comptroller). He served in several senior positions before retiring in 2003 as deputy director of the Operations Division at the Department of the Navy. During his career with the navy, he received the Department of the Navy's Meritorious Civilian Service Award, the Superior Civilian Service Award, and the Distinguished Civilian Service Award.

THE ALUMNA OF THE YEAR

Anne K. Altman, BS Marketing '82, was appointed general manager of IBM Global Public Sector in August 2009, giving her responsibility for its strategy, direction, development of solutions, and sales for government, education, health care, life sciences, and pharmaceutical industries worldwide. She joined IBM in 1981 as a systems engineer and has held a series of increasingly responsible positions in software, global hardware and software sales, operations, technology development, marketing, and consulting. In addition to her current role as general manager of the Global Public Sector, Altman is a member of IBM's Performance Team and Integration and Values Team. Awards for her outstanding contribution to the information technology industry include Federal Computer Week's Top Federal 100 and Eagle Award, the AFFIRM Leadership Award for Industry, and the CIO Council's Azimuth Award for the Industry Executive of the Year. Altman is recognized as a thought leader in areas ranging from e-government to national security and her work has been featured in leading media outlets, including the *Washington Post*, Associated Press, *Federal Computer Week*, *Washington Technology*, *Government Computer News*, and *Information Week*. She also is a contributor to key government-related review boards for such organizations as the National Academy of Public Administration, the National Academy of Sciences, and the Private Sector Council. A former member of Mason's Board of Visitors, Altman is committed to community service and serves on the boards of the Northern Virginia Technology Council, the James Madison University Executive Advisory Council, the National Symphony Orchestra, the National Kidney Foundation, and the Armed Forces Communications Electronics Association Executive Committee.
